

Hello everyone! I hope all is well!




Here is some current news about the vaccinations in Minnesota: Our Governor Tim Walz will eligibility be increasing the amount of vaccines given to 1.8 million more Minnesota's today (Wednesday March 10th, 2021). Walz clearly indicates that people 65 and older are the "top priority" and should get the vaccines first. After the elderly get vaccinated, then health care workers & teachers will be vaccinated. For example, at DeLaSalle high school (aka my school), some of my teachers have already been vaccinated. I hope all schools will have access to the vaccinations really soon.

Current updates on case numbers: Wednesday's total cases are 731 confirmed cases & around 191 probable cases. The total amount of cases has been decreasing so far, which is good news.

#### Greece

As COVID-19 infections began to be reported around the world, many countries responded by shutting down public places like schools, workplaces and international borders in order to contain the spread of the virus. That's what also happened in my country, Greece. The lockdown has been going on for months and it actually feels like ages to me. But I feel really lucky to say that in my country the vaccination has already started, so it's nice to say that hopefully this lockdown will soon come to an end.

Greece has completed over 290,000 vaccinations since the start of the inoculation program. The first phase of the government's vaccination plan included the inoculation of high priority groups including frontline health care staff, as well as elderly and residents at nursing homes. The second phase included individuals over 85.

Now, 18 islands throughout Greece are considered COVID-19 free, with some of them having done both doses of the vaccine to their

#### Types of vaccines

- 1-Whole virus vaccines as BCG vaccine for tuberculosis.
- 2-Protein subunit vaccines and it's the only type that is being developed against the virus that causes COVID-19.
- 3-Viral vector vaccines as rVSV-ZEBOV vaccine against Ebola.
- 4-Nucleic acid vaccines, so far this type hasn't been approved for human use yet.

#### AIFA prohibits the use of an AstraZeneca lot.

AIFA, following the reporting of some serious adverse events in temporal concomitance with the administration of doses belonging to a batch of the AstraZeneca anti covid 19 vaccine has decided as a precaution to ban the use of this batch throughout the national Italian territory today (11.02.2021). At present, no casual link has been established between the administration of the vaccine and these events. AIFA is carrying out all the necessary checks and will communicate any new information that becomes available. The samples of this lot will also be analysed by the National Institute of Health.

This is obviously shocking news to hear from anyone who just received the AstraZeneca vaccine, and I really hope everything will soon get sort out after all the right investigations are done.

Challenges in the travel industry:

The new normal?

#### Information about travelling in pandemic

Because half of all COVID cases are spread by people without symptoms, experts continue to caution that one negative COVID test provides no guarantee that you're COVID-free and not contagious. Those who choose to travel need to ensure they are not further contributing to the spread of the disease, difficult to do given limitations in the accuracy of testing and how easily the virus is transmitted. Until the pandemic is over (and it's far from over), keep asking: Yes, you CAN travel, but SHOULD you travel?

Many countries continue to recommend their citizens only travel if it's truly essential, internationally as well as outside their state or province.

Travel restrictions began in Wuhan in January and grew in almost every other country by March. Many still exist in early 2021. Some countries limited who could enter their borders by passport or COVID test status, some implemented outright travel bans, and others closed their borders to all nonessential travel. The UN World Tourism Organization reported May 31, 2020, that 100% of the world's destinations had travel restrictions in place and 75% had borders closed completely to international tourists.

Bans encourage people to lie about their symptoms, where they have been, and whether they've been exposed to illness. Many people are so desperate to get to their destination that they board flights knowing they have symptoms.

The UN World Tourism Organization announced on June 4, 2020, that "the time has come to restart tourism." Most countries reopened in 2020, but, as of March 2021, many are still only open to their own citizens and for essential travel.


The Secretary General reported that more than 120 million tourism jobs were at risk (plus 144 million related jobs in associated sectors like food service) and more than \$320 billion in exports were lost (three times the loss in 2009, the last global financial crisis).

Almost all countries screen arrivals for symptoms, many require proof of a negative COVID test prior to arrival, some require testing on arrival and/or several days after. Some countries require mandatory self-isolation/quarantine (occasionally within a resort's property) and some only require quarantine if a passenger tests positive.

Many airlines discontinued international flights, reduced domestic flights, and some temporarily shut their operations. As the pandemic progressed, some countries grounded international flights completely.

COVID has significantly affected the airline industry, and there's concern that air travel won't recover until 2024. In a November 2020 briefing, the International Air Transport Association (IATA) announced that airline revenues are down 60% for 2020 and estimated losses are \$118.5 billion, which threaten the industry's continued survival, particularly for smaller airlines and airports.

Despite the beginnings of vaccinations, the new normal for all travel—whether around the world or around the block—means masks, physical distancing, enhanced cleanliness, and vigilance in monitoring ourselves for the mildest of symptoms.







#### COMING SOON: VACCINE PASSPORT #

The vaccine passport

What is a vaccine pass or passport?

A vaccination pass or passport is documentation proving that you have been vaccinated against Covid-19. Some versions will also allow people to show that they have tested negative for the virus, and therefore can more easily travel. The versions being worked on now by airlines, industry groups, nonprofits and technology companies will be something you can pull up on your mobile phone as an app or part of your digital wallet.

Among governments and those in the travel industry, a new term has entered the vocabulary: vaccine passport.

One of President Biden's executive orders aimed at curbing the pandemic asks government agencies to "assess the feasibility" of linking coronavirus vaccine certificates with other vaccination documents, and producing digital versions of them.

Denmark's government said on Wednesday that in the next three to four months, it will roll out a digital passport that will allow citizens to show they have been vaccinated.

It isn't just governments that are suggesting vaccine passports. In a few weeks, Etihad Airways and Emirates will start using a digital travel pass, developed by the International Air Transport Association, to help passengers manage their travel plans and provide airlines and governments documentation that they have been vaccinated or tested for Covid-19.

"It's about trying to digitize a process that happens now and make it into something that allows for more harmony and ease, making it easier for people to travel between countries without having to pull out different papers for different countries and different documents at different checkpoints," said Nick Careen, senior vice president for airport, passenger, cargo and security at I.A.T.A. Mr. Careen has been leading I.A.T.A.'s travel pass initiative.

Has this been done before?

Having to prove you've been vaccinated in order to participate in activities or enter certain countries is not a new concept. For decades, people traveling to some countries have had to prove that they have been vaccinated against diseases such as yellow fever, rubella and cholera. Often, after being vaccinated, travelers received a signed and stamped "yellow card," known as an International Certificate of Vaccination or Prophylaxis, which the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention still urge people to take on relevant trips. Vaccine passports don't have to be digital, but they would make the travel process smoother.

For those without smartphones, the industry says it will accept paper proof, but even that needs to be standardized.

In addition, there are concerns about privacy and data sharing.

The travel, tourism and hospitality industry has been decimated by the impact of the coronavirus COVID-19 outbreak.

Countries are still actively battling the deadly virus but societies and industries are now also looking to rebuild and reemerge from the crisis.

The recovery process for the travel industry will be complicated and lengthy.




